The Getting Ahead classes are a component of the Starkville Bridges initiative, and they focus on learning the causes of poverty, the hidden rules of the middle-class, and how to build resources for individuals in low-income situations. Each week (16 weeks) the participants met for 2.5 hours to accomplish these objectives. Thank you to John Breazeale and Lynn Peterson for serving as facilitators and Sara Moye for co-facilitation.

Rose Coffey-Graham was the speaker on behalf of the graduates. She cited a beautiful rendition of a personally written poem.

Sara Moye named Bridges board member

Our newest board member and 2012 Getting Ahead graduate, Sara Moye, shares a little of her story...

"My name is Sara Moye and I am a resident of Starkville, MS. I became a volunteer for Bridges Out of Poverty because of the positive influence that the Getting Ahead class had on my life. I have learned a lot from this program, and I believe that I should educate others about the many resources that we have in Oktibbeha County.

When I was in high school, I thought I was grown and unstoppable, but I didn't know what was around the corner. At first I blamed everyone for my mistakes, and then I realized that it was me making the mistakes. I have lived a hard life, but through God I am a survivor.

People think that when you are in poverty, you are always looking for public assistance, but they must be careful not to judge, just as I have learned not to judge those in the middle class. I work very hard, and if people would take time to walk in my shoes, they would see that I do more

than sit around the house all day eating and watching TV.

I am a high school graduate, I plan to soon attend EMCC, but being there for my family is my most precious gift.

I enjoy taking care of them. My mother had six children, and my sister and I are the only 2 survivors. I believe that there is a reason that I am still here, and that is to help others who may be in the same situation that I find myself.

Through Bridges, I have come to realize that there is a better future for me and my family. This is something that I never dared to believe in before. I served as a facilitator for the Getting Ahead class of 2013, and remain available to do whatever I can to help Bridges. I am now serving on the board of directors, where my insights and contributions are valuable to the success of this initiative."



Lynn's Response to the detractors of Robbie Ward's Story on Sara Moye:

"If you haven't been exposed to the *Bridges Out of Poverty* constructs, it is easy to fall into the middle class cop out and say, "Where is the story?" However, once you understand people in generational poverty typically have NO future story, the advancements Sara has made are huge! She has taught our group more than we could have ever imagined. Our initiative has only been in existence for two years, and it isn't perfect. At least we are not waiting to do something. It is hard to confront this issue head on without reverting to quips about getting a job, not having babies, and getting an education. I know, I am one of those "people who have all the answers," but, once I was exposed to the research and the Bridges material, the blinders came off of my eyes. I now understand there are "barriers" at the individual, community and institutional levels. Because I am hard core middle-class, it has taken me three years to be able to honestly see the institutional barriers and to acknowledge the simple tweaking that could take place to allow our general dollars to be spent more wisely."

Bridges National Conference-Oklahoma City, Oklahoma

In September, five of our members signed up for the Bridges National Conference in Oklahoma City. Jennifer Gregory donated her time and effort to make all of the logistical arrangments, but could not attend due to her representation of Starkville in Jackson on the C Spire project. Congrats to both Jennifer and Taylor Smith on your success!

The four members of our group who attended were Kathleen Olivieri, John Breazeale, Roderick Holmes, and Lynn Phillips-Gaines. Everyone that attended had different "Aha experiences," which are sure to impact the Starkville Bridges initiative.

Lynn Phillips-Gaines described her experience by saying, "I learned about creative ways to bring the Bridges constructs and approach the various sectors of the community. Identifying a trainer who can be called upon to do these trainings is of paramount importance."

In the words of Roderick Holmes, "I don't think I met a person there that didn't possess hope within their individual and organizational efforts. Building Bridges is all about that very aspect; hope. I felt that in sincerely in every session. That single word is the structural key that can and will mold all levels and aspects of poverty into non-existence."

According to Kathleen Olivieri, "One common denominator that I observed was that the Bridges out of Poverty initiatives were coordinated under one agency or entity in the community. Starkville Bridges was the only successful group in attendance who consisted of all volunteers! I was very surprised by this realization!"

"Because our university is such an integral part of our community's success, Starkville Bridges must extend our reach to faculty, staff and students. Faculty and staff need educational training and time to examine processes in their offices. Students who come from under-resourced backgrounds view MSU from a totally different mindset that the middle class. Due to the changing funding structure of all IHL's in Mississippi, the needs of all students must be addressed and learning/applying the constructs of Bridges is an excellent beginning!"

"After attending the National Bridges Conference, our group realizes the Bridges initiative is so much more than providing Getting Ahead classes and mentoring," mused Lynn. It is a way to remove community and institutional barriers to financial sustainability in Starkville. This is very exciting! So, please invite anyone who has been attracted to this initiative to be in these vital upcoming conversations about our future!

Getting Familiar with those donating time and talent

Roderick Holmes

Roderick Holmes is the new Volunteer Coordinator for the Maroon Volunteer Center, adopting the former position of Stedmond Ware. Since acquiring this new position, Rod has become very involved with Bridges, demonstrating his deep concern for those in poverty, and desire to assist in carrying out our initiative. For those not familiar with Rod, we asked him to write a narrative of his life to help everyone get to know him, as we look forward to working closely with him in the future!

"I was born in Louisville, MS. During my grade school years, I had a desire to be different, and walked the edge of trouble and curiosity to see life in a whole new direction. Nevertheless, I had parents who stayed in my life as a strong influence, and an older brother and younger sister that meant the world to me. Even though I had my threats of boarding school, my goal was to never let my sister down; she's my best friend.

After graduating high school, I enlisted into the United States Air Force for four years, in Security Forces. During that time, I was deployed to numerous training locations, many cities within the U.S., and also deployment assignments to Saudi Arabia and Iraq. After spending four years in active duty, my mindset was unstable, and I needed a change. I left the military in 2005, and lived in Baltimore, California, Ohio, Florida, Texas and Washington State. I got to know many individuals from previous years, even though some were of good and bad influence.

The work I did throughout those years was both legal and illegal to say the least. After involvement with some people and crimes that I was not proud to affiliate with, I decided to move back to the gulf coast where I started work with the Air Force reserve system.

After being on the coast for a year, I decided that Atlanta was a place where I could live, so I moved there with the



hope to pursue music, and any attempt to make more money than what I was making. I became a certified songwriter with SESAC International, where I wrote under engineer and super producer Roahn Hylton for celebrity names such as Mario and Trey Songz.

In Atlanta, I also worked with the Reserve system. Regardless, I spent my free time with some of the same people that weren't of a "quality" nature. In 2008, I was charged with a felony, and was in and out of prison with good behavior conditions with both the state of Georgia and the Air Force reserves. In 2009, I was released with a new chance to be a better man that I once was.

Once I was allowed to work and my conditions of probation/parole were negotiated, I became a bartender until the summer of 2010. Once I was authorized to leave the state. I moved back to Mississippi. In the fall of 2010, I enrolled in Mississippi State University, and kept my change of faith towards Christ that I made at a summer revival a month prior in my home church in Louisville. With a renewed faith and a second chance in life to make sure situational poverty and the consequences of failed motivation remained on a path of achievement, I set out to prove a point of success. While I attended MSU, a kept a grade point was invited to numerous honor societies such as Lambda Pi Eta, Omicron Delta Kappa, and became a Prince Hall Mason. I was employed for two years with 91.1FM WMSV as the after personality, and the producer for their syndicated sports show, Southeastern Drive Time. I graduated in the spring of 2013 Cum Laude with a degree in communication with a concentration in broadcast journalism. I now work in the Office of Student Leadership and Community Engagement and the Maroon Volunteer Center as a Volunteer Coordinator."
