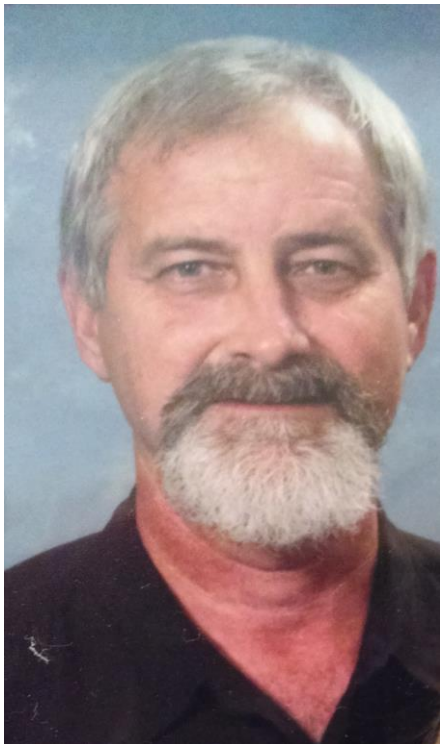

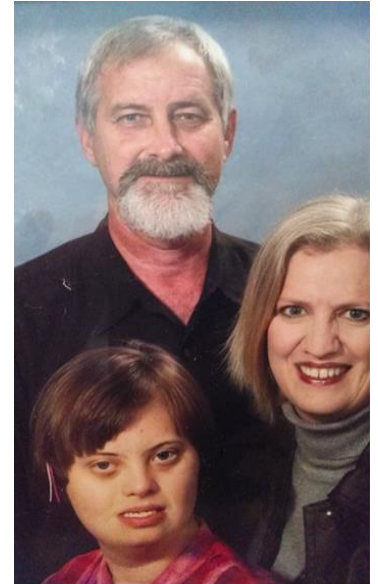
He is a member of University Baptist Church and the Starkville Civitan Club. He is the Construction Supervisor for the Starkville Area Habitat for Humanity. John has

been in this position since 2000. Then in 2011, John decided to become even involved in the community by becoming a part of the Steering Committee for the new community project, *Starkville Bridges* which is inspired from the book, *Bridges Out Of Poverty: Strategies for Professionals and Communities*, written by Ruby K. Payne, Phillip E. Devol, and Terie Dreussi Smith. Mrs. Lynn Phillips-Gaines founded this initiative and was the first Board of Directors President.

John remained on the Steering Committee until he became a chartered member of the Board of Directors. John became a trained facilitator and taught his own Getting Ahead class in the year 2013. Because of his intensive involvement in *Starkville Bridges* it was no surprise when John became the President of the Board beginning in the year of 2014. While presiding over *Starkville*

Bridges, John is still maintains his job as the Construction Supervisor of Habitat for Humanity; nonetheless, it is safe to say, John is hardworking and dedicated to eradicating poverty and helping the Starkville community.

Lynn Phillips-Gaines, Certified Financial Planner of *Phillips Financial* and Registered Principal of *Raymond James Financial Services, Inc.*, founded *Starkville Bridges out of Poverty* in the year 2011. She served as President of the Board of Directors from 2011 until January 2014.

Realizing the need for an anti-poverty program in her community, Lynn's first step was to further educate herself. She completed course work

and testing to become a Certified Trainer for the *Bridges out of Poverty* program and then brought together key stakeholders of the community, which formed the *Starkville Bridges* Steering Committee.

Since inception of the initiative, *Starkville Bridges out of Poverty* has held three *Getting Ahead in a Just Getting by World* Facilitator Classes. From these classes, another program, *Building Bridges for Kids (BB4K)*, was formed. In addition to these classes, Lynn organized and hosted two Summer Soiree Fundraisers. Aside from *Bridges out of Poverty*, Mrs. Lynn Phillips-Gaines has been involved in numerous charities and community projects over the years,

including the *Phillips Financial Habitat Classic*. In 2013, Lynn was recognized as "Woman of the Year" by *Starkville Daily News*. She also received the T.E. Veitch Community Service Award and the 2013 Rotary Community Service Award.

Due to the success of these endeavors and the overwhelming support from volunteers, Lynn felt her community would further benefit from having a staff that was devoted solely to the program. Lynn's last duty as the President of the Board of Directors was to put together a strategic planning meeting, during which goals were set for *Starkville Bridges* for the next three years.
